Dear Parents,

Firstly, we have had a lovely week in school and the spotlight has been on reading. Mrs Moore and Mrs Standish have been observing reading lessons, talking to children about their reading, and looking through guided reading books. It is clear that there is a love of reading at St. Lawrence with children engaged and interested with the texts that they are reading in class and at home. The **VIPERS** approach is our new approach to teaching the six domains of reading to aid comprehension. This week you should have received the new bookmarks in your child's reading



journal that will support you when you read with your child at home. As we are unable to hold our usual parent workshops, we will be sending out a reading leaflet on ways you can support your child at home. We do hope that you find this most useful. See attached appendix. The triangulated approach with school and home working together with the child at the centre, is most effective in children becoming confident, fluent readers.

You will have had notification that following Telford and Wrekin advice we have taken the decision not to invite parents to the church to watch the Christmas Nativity. I hope you understand that the decision has not taken lightly and it has been made in the best interests of the children and their families. As a solution focused school, we have decided to hold 'carols around the tree' instead, this will be on the same day



and times. The children will still practise and perform their Nativity play and we shall record it so you will be able to watch it from the comfort of your own home.

Staff are trying their hardest to adhere to guidelines, keep the community safe whilst ensuring children have all the wonderful Christmas experiences that they deserve. 


# Reading leaflet for parents

Help your child read at home,

#### Reading at St. Lawrence CE Primary School

Intent - We believe that the teaching of reading is integral to a child's understanding and appreciation of the world around them; a platform that allows our children to see beyond what they know, share in cultural experiences and develop the vocabulary they need to effectively express themselves. At the heart of our reading curriculum is our drive to foster a love of reading, enriching children's learning through carefully designed teaching activities and access to thought provoking texts. Reading is at the very heart of our curriculum and we strongly believe it is the window to the world.

Implementation -Learning to read is one of the most important things your child will ever learn. It underpins everything else, so we put as much energy as we possibly can into making sure that every single child learns to read as quickly as possible. We also want your child to develop a real love of reading and for them to want to read for themselves. This is why we work hard to make sure children develop a love of books as well as simply learning to read.


As children begin their reading journey, the reading curriculum is delivered through Read, Write, Inc synthetic phonics as a vehicle for word reading. This is rolled out in to Key Stage 2 as an intervention for those children who are not secure with some of the more complex sounds taught in Set 3 of the phonics programme.

We provide regular whole class 'Book Talk' sessions from Reception to Y6 to promote the comprehension strand of reading. Opportunities for independent reading and hearing quality texts read aloud every day are integral to our reading curriculum. We work with children to develop their understanding of texts through guided reading and whole class comprehension activities and have recently introduced 'Reading Vipers' to focus on the key areas of comprehension.

#### READING VIPERS

Reading VIPERS is our new way of supporting children with their reading comprehension skills using the six domains of reading. All children will be working on VIPERS during class reading, whether it is reading as a class, in a small group, or one-to-one with an adult. It would be fantastic if parents could also be referring to VIPERS when they listen to their child read at home. Each of the letters stand for one of the key reading skills that will enable our pupils to become strong, confident readers. You will find a VIPERS bookmark in your child's reading diary that will give you some examples of the types of questions to ask when your child is reading their book.

VIPERS posters are displayed in all classrooms. Up to the end of Year 2, the 'S' stands for 'Sequence'. Once children move into Year 3, the 'S' stands for 'Summarise', which is a more demanding skill.




In Class 1 we use VIPERS but children recognise the letters by the different types of dogs to help them remember.



#### Question Openers

VIPERS can be used on any text that a child is reading, as well as on pictures, picture books and films! When any adult is listening to a child read, all they have to do is think of questions about the book, picture or film that cover all of the VIPERS. You can use the VIPERS bookmark attached to your child's reading record for examples of questions. Below are examples of how you can create your own questions. Three dwarfs, travelling as swiftly as one through through the dark paths beneath the mountains:

"Hurry!" said the dwarf at the rear. "We have to buy her the finest silken cloth in Dorimar. If we do not hurry, perhaps it will be sold, and we will be forced to buy her the second finest cloth."

"We know! We know!" said the dwarf at the front. "And we shall buy her a case to carry it back in, so it will remain perfectly clean and untouched by dust."

The dwarf in the middle said nothing. He was holding his stone tightly, not dropping it or losing it, and was concentrating on nothing else but this.

The questions for this section could be:

V: Which word shows that it was impossible to cross the mountain range?

P: What do you think the next paragraph will be talking about? R: Where would someone in this story get silk from?

S: What purpose does this paragraph serve? How does it do it?

E: Explain why the author chooses not to name the person that they are buying the silks for.

I: Tell me something about the stone that the dwarf is carrying. Use evidence from the text.

#### Helping your child at home

You, as a role model in your child's life, play a vital part in developing your child's attitude to reading. To improve your child's chances of becoming a keen and confident reader, you must demonstrate an enthusiasm towards reading and encourage your child to take an interest in print around them.

- On packaging, labels and instructions;
- On information boards and menus;
- Comics, websites, magazines, newspapers, recipe books, birthday cards, and even shopping lists!


#### How you can support your child at home:

 Reading should be enjoyed. Find a comfortable place to read, be patient and praise often.

Make reading a daily routine:

- Listen to your child read aloud daily, aiming for 10 to 15 minutes a day.
- Read to your child, enjoying books together and modelling to them how an expert reads.

Remember praise is a great motivator! Always remind your child how well they are doing and how proud you are of their reading. Reading is a journey to be enjoyed!



The ability to read fluently and with comprehension (understanding) is the most fundamental skill that children will learn. Children will first need to 'learn to read' in order to be able to 'read to learn'.

#### Discuss the text ('book talk')

New book: Look at cover. What is it about? Who is the author? What is the title? What type of book is it?

Partially read book: What have you liked so far? In 5 sentences, explain to me what has happened. Who is the main character? etc.

#### Listen to your child read

- You can:

  Praise and encour
- Praise and encourage often
   Check understanding of unfamiliar words and explicitly teach new vocabulary.
- Encourage them to re-read words and sentences to improve accuracy and expression.
- Model reading with expression and ask your child to copy.
- Ask questions to check for understanding.

#### They can:

- Sound out unfamiliar words in chunks and then blend them.
- Use pictures as clues to unfamiliar words, or infer more information about the text.

## Question for understanding Ask a question or two (don't make it a chore!) See some example question stems below.

### Discuss the text ('book talk')

What did you like about it? Why?

Was there anything you disliked? Why?

Were there any parts that confused you?

Did it remind you of anything else you read?
