Residential trip to York

On arrival, they visited the spectacular Jorvik Museum where the children learnt all about how the Vikings lived from the fantastic life size displays in the museum. The sounds, sights and smells experienced on the ride around the museum really brought the Vikings to life for the children. After, they visited the York Dungeons where the real life actors retold a range of historical stories, and thoroughly entertained the pupils for the afternoon. They then travelled to their accommodation in York where the children had an evening meal and then spent the rest of the evening sharing quizzes, games and conversations with each other across both schools. Here, they were enthralled by the various displays on offer, from World War 1 to the Victorians, to visiting the parts of the Museum which used to be a real life prison. Mental Health Week

This week has been Children's Mental Health Week.

Children's Mental Health Week is organised by the <u>Place2Be</u> charity and is taking place from Feb 6th-12th. This year's theme is 'Let's Connect' to encourage children (and adults) to look at how we can make meaningful connections. When we have healthy connections – to family, friends and others – this can support our mental health and our sense of wellbeing.

1 in 6 children have a diagnosable mental health issue, so it's really important to help each other out when we can, and to find ways to take care of our minds. One very simple but powerful way to connect with others is through kindness.

Kindness is a simple way to help EVERYONE. When we are kind to each other, it helps us to feel connected, which means we forge new friendships or deepen existing ones. Research has also shown that when we're kind, when someone is kind to us or even if we just witness kindness, our bodies release feel-good hormones which lift our mood, giving us what's known as a 'Helper's High'. Kindness isn't just a nice thing to do, but can help us improve our own well-being, while helping others at the same time. And Children's Mental Health Week is a perfect time to start!
