Dear parents & carers,

Welcome back and Happy New Year to you all. As I drove through the crisp, wintry (but lethal!) lanes this week to both schools, I was reminded about our Christian value for Spring One: Courageousness. Courage to take risks, courage to persist and courage to do the right thing. It's a quality that is so important for our children to learn as they will progress further in their lives and make more of themselves.

At St Lawrence there are lots of changes afoot with a redesigned hall, big interactive screen and indoor sensory gym. Spring also heralds the new reading squads being introduced so that children can build on their fluency after being able to decode different sounds.

We were fortunate enough to receive feedback from the Well-being Charter Mark team this week. They have been collecting views from pupils, staff and parents and helping to shape the future priorities for the school. Then after a term, we plan to share them with the pupils at St Lawrence so they can be spoilt by even more children!

Senior leaders have also been planning our residential offers this year and again combining both schools so they can share in the experiences. At the moment we are thinking about an overnight stay for Year 2 & 3 locally and possibly an overseas residential for our older children in September of this year. More information to follow in due course.

Lastly, despite some winter viruses and a bout of chickenpox, attendance has improved since the end of last year. Further on in the newsletter, the two assistant headteachers will talk more about our focus on attendance and punctuality going forward.

Support on Attendance



Mr Battrick has commented this week on the relatively strong attendance at both schools this week which has been great to see and long may it continue.

Every day that a child attends school is precious because each lesson build on what children already know and missing just one can make the following lesson much more difficult. Just one day could be as many as seven missed lessons, as well as time spent with friends and doing extracurricular activities.

As parents, you can support your child's physical, social and mental wellbeing by ensuring they are in school every day. It can be difficult to know whether your child is too ill to attend school. NHS guidance is clear that it's fine to send them in with a minor cough or common cold, provided they don't have a temperature. Our school website has a great guide to help determine whether your child is too ill to attend school: Attendance



In addition, we know that parents and carers worry about their children's mental health. Rather than keeping your child off school, let us know about your concerns. We can then work together on supporting your child. School is an enriching environment that can help your child with their social and mental wellbeing. It isn't just about learning. It's a warm, supportive environment where your child can get a healthy meal and see their friends and is important for equipping your child with skills for life. Attending school every day can help your child to achieve their aspirations, and the aspirations you have for them.

Lastly when it comes to taking holidays in term time, our response will invariably be the same and any request not sanctioned. There are very few exceptions to this given our strong belief that every day a child attends school is vital.

We have the same expectations as our neighbouring schools in the Newport Cluster including secondary settings such as Burton Borough, Charlton, Ercall Wood and Adam's. This means you will hear the same messages for the other children in your family as we work closely on attendance as a local partnership of schools.

Thank you again for your support in developing a culture of good attendance that will follow children through their lives into adulthood.
